# PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

## REGULAR SESSION—MAY 19, 1890.]

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, May 19th, A. D. 1890, at 8:00 o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Thomas L. The Proceedings of the Common Council for the special session held April 28st, and the regular session held May 5th, 1890, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Councilmen, said Journals were approved as published.

His Honor, the Mayor, presented the following communication; which was read and received:

SIG. 26

An Address to the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of Indianapolis, from the Central Labor Union, a body composed of delegates representing the various Unions of Organized Labor of this city:

To the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, a committee appointed by the Central Labor Union, and whose instructions were to act on behalf of that organization in the preparation and presentation of an address to your honorable bodies, together with an expression of disapproval of the passage of an ordinance, granting certaig valuable privileges to the Citizens' Street Railway, which are specified hereinafter, offer the following for your consideration, as indicative of the opinion of Organized Labor of this city on this subject:

1st. We believe it would be an invasion of the rights of our citizens and the coming generation, no less than criminal to vote away the franchise of the streets of our city to the alien corporation, who now have possession of every thoroughfare within its boundaries, and whose present franchise holds good until 1900, something more than ten years yet, and, especially, would we consider it wrong and unjust to the farthest degree to enact such an ordinance on the terms and for the length of time recently recommended by a committee representing the Commercial Club of this city.

The extension of the present franchise of the above named corporation until the year 1926, or in all, more than 36 years, on a mere verbal agreement to substitute rapid transit on all its lines, for it present mule service, together with the best and latest appliances, as the committee named recommends, we deem would be extremely foolish and unjust, and once accomplished, would render the city and her people subject to the whim and caprice of as conscienceless a monopoly as ever existed.

2d. It is hardly worth while to call attention to recent doings of this company, that has time and again disregarded the mandates of your body, and trampled on the rights and privileges of all with whom it came into contact, at least, if they in any way conflicted with the desires of the assumed owners of our streets.

The continued inflction of bob-tailed cars, pulled by jack-rabbit mules, over tracks in many sections of the system, so rough as to preclude the possibility of reading ordinary print, with any degree of satisfaction, and in response to your command, to live up to the terms of its ordinance, the same declared to be mandatory by the courts, endeavors to avoid its plain duty and obligations by filing a statement that the present style of cars and appliances, together with its general service is patterned after that existing in other cities, exhibits gall simply sublime and incomprehensible.

We could also mention the refusal of this company to pay its just share of street paying, after giving, at different times, verbal agreements on promises to do so whenever called upon, and many other arbitrary actions unnecessary to recite.

3d. Believing the higher court of the State will reverse the decision lately handed down by Judge Howland, absolving this cerporation from paying any part of the expense of paying along and between its tracks, and in the event of a failure to do so, that the Legislature has the power to compel such payment, and believing the spirit of the age is against the granting of long-time franchises, we feel that you will best subseve the interests of the city and her people by holding in abeyance the consideration of any street railway ordinance that may be presented to your body.

Within the time over which the franchise under which this company operates, extends, the spirit of the age will have time to assert itself, we, therefore, solemnly protest against the passage of any measures calculated to forestall or hamper it.

4th. In conclusion, we wish to express the opinion that the time is rapidly approaching when the street car fare can and must be reduced, without detriment to the service and with material benefit to the masses, and particularly so to the great body of wage earners, who under our present system are compelled to seek remote quarters of the city, in order to enjoy a healthful breathing space, unless they will submit to be penned up in crowded and miserable tenement quarters,

away from the sunlight and verdure of the fields and common that surround the city on all sides, and are thus peculiarly subjected to continuous and burdensome sacrifices in the surrender of a large percentage of their daily earnings, to enable them to reach their places of employment, all of which goes to swell the profits reaped by the absent and alien millionaires, whose only interest in our city lie in their ability to maintain a monopoly of our streets, and through this power to extract from the people, a considerable portion of the results of their industry, without anything bordering on a fair return for the privileges thus enjoyed. In many other cities, notably St. Louis, where active competition exists, cheaper car fare is a realty, even for adults, and children twelve yeare of age and under at half price. The companies provide tickets to its patrons at a fraction over four cents each, or six tickets for twenty five cents, and ten half fare tickets for children for the same amount. These tickets also serve as a medium for exchange within the limits of the city and her suburbs.

#### REPORTS, ETC., FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Attorney submitted the following report; which was read and the recommendation concurred in:

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind:

Gentlemen:-I have prepared and submit herewith an ordinance regulating the granting of permits and the erection of buildings within the city limits. Statute provides that the Board of Public Improvements shall grant permits. ordinance now in force imposes this duty on the City Clerk, which, in my judgment, is illegal; therefore, I have provided substantially that the Board of Public Improvements shall grant, and the City Clerk issue and keep a register of building permits. I have requested the Indianapolis Chapter of American Institute of Architects to prepare specifications for buildings, and this ordinance is substantially those specifications, copies of which I leave on your desks.

With reference to the motion referred to me instructing the Street Commissioner to take up the old street car track on Madison avenue and Delaware street, I recommend that the same be adopted, as such track is a piece of broken. track without connection with any other line at either end of such track.

Dear Sir :- Having been informed of the resolution of Council, ordering the Street Committee to remove certain tracks at Meridian street, I wish to call your attention to the position of the Union Railway Company regarding Meridian street and the viaduct.

This Company is ready to begin work at once, provided the question of closing Meridian street was settled by the Supreme Court, to which an appeal has been

taken by the property owners on Meridian street, but if Meridian street can not be closed, a viaduct between Meridian and Pennsylvania street would be worthless.

If the city will select some other street, Pennsylvania, Delaware or Virginia avenue, in lieu of Meridian street site, we will willingly put the viaduct there, as soon as the damage can be settled.

The Railroad Company has not been sitting idly by, while the city has been passing resolutions, but, on the contrary, it has been, and is now, working on a plan, which, if successful, will be of more general benefit to the city than this viaduct can possibly be. It is, of course, impossible for me (for business reasons), to say just what those plans are, but we are in hopes that they will be carried out inside of sixty days, we would therefore ask that you stay proceedings as to removal of tracks, at least, that period of time, or the Railway Company will pay to the city the amount the viaduct would cost the Railway Company, provided the city will accept that in lieu of the viaduct, and as consideration of the contract between the city and Railway Company.

The City Clerk is hereby required to issue, and the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police to serve, the proper notices upon the City Commissioners and the petitioners are hereby required to serve the proper notices upon the property owners, and to show, by affidavit, due service of such notices: *Provided*, that before

the City Clerk issue the said notices to the City Commissioners, a bond shall be filed with said City Clerk to the approval of the Mayor guaranteeing the payment of all costs and charges of said Commissioners in this matter.

Which report was concurred in, and the resolution adopted, by the following vote:
