

City Council Chamber
June 14, 1852

Council met. Present: Messrs Louden, Pitts, Delzell, Buchanan, Greer, Pitts & Culley.

Minutes of preceding meeting read and adopted.

Mr. Louden presented an ordinance entitled "an ordinance amendatory of the various ordinances relative to the public markets of the City of Indianapolis", which was adopted as follows:

"An ordinance amendatory of the various ordinances relative to the public markets of the City of Indianapolis".

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Indianapolis, That hereafter the markets shall be held in the East Market House on Wednesday and Saturday, and in the West Market House on Tuesday & Friday of each week; and no markets shall be opened in either of said Market Houses on any other days.

Sec. 2 Said markets shall be opened at daylight in the morning from the first day of May to the first day of October; and from the first day of October to the 31st day of April at 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock A.M. at which time the Market Master shall give notice by ringing the bells.

Sec. 3. All former ordinances coming within the purview of the ordinance and conflicting therewith, be and the same are hereby repealed."

Mr. Thomas Morris petitioned the Council, verbally, for a certain grant for a general passenger depot, on Louisiana street whereupon the following resolution was, on motion, adopted:

"Resolved, That permission be hereby granted to the several Railroads companies interested in the "general passenger depot", to build said depot so as to occupy not more than fifteen feet of the South Side of Louisiana street between Meridian and Illinois Streets: provided the said companies cause to be opened a new street from Illinois to Meridian Streets seventy five feet wide, on the south side of said depot, and erect a good and substantial bridge across the creek in said new street, which said street shall be opened by 1st October, 1852, and when opened it shall be and remain a public street for the benefit of the City".

Mr. Pitts offered a resolution appropriating forty dollars to the 4th Ward for certain improvements mentioned.

Referred to committee on Street, alleys, etc. with instructions to make such improvements in the streets, etc. as the health of the citizens demand, and the means of the City will allow.

Mr. Greer offered for adoption the following resolution:

"Resolved That the fines against Mr. Manville, (for a violation of the ordinances of the city in regard to selling liquors without license) by the Mayor, be and are hereby remitted, he paying the costs, and the attorneys fees."

On Motion by Mr. Buchanan, the resolution was amended by adding: "Provided Mr. Manville give bond in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars with good and sufficient security that he will not directly or indirectly retail liquor in the City in violation of law".

The question being on the adoption of the resolution as amended, the ayes and nays were demanded, which resulted as follows:

Ayes: Messrs Louden, Delzell, Buchanan & Greer 4
Nays: Messrs Pitts and Culley 2
The resolution was so adopted.

On Motion by Mr. Louden
Allowed Oliver Rice was allowed twenty-five dollars as part pay for pumps furnished the City School lots.

Mr. Greer, Chairman of Committee on ways and means to whom were referred that matter presented the following report:

"The committee on Ways and means would report that they have examined the fence enclosing the old City Cemetery and find it so decayed that they recommend for adoption the following resolution.

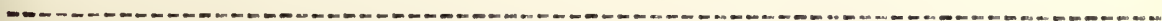
"Resolved That the President of the City Council be and is hereby authorized to let the erecting of an entirely new fence, to enclose the old City Cemetery, to the lowest responsible bidder, said bidder being entitled to the fencing at present surrounding the cemetery."

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted.

"Ordered, That the City Engineer be directed to examine Louisiana Street between Alabama and East Street and ascertain whether the Lawrenceburg and upper Mississippi Railroad Company are complying with the established grade of the City and report at next meeting."

On Motion by Mr. Pitts, it was,

Resolved That as soon as practicable the Secretary of the City Council arrange the ordinance, and have five hundred copies of the same printed in pamphlet form. The lowest bidder of the printers in city to be entitled to said work.

The Treasurer presented his yearly report, read and accepted & filed in the papers of the city.
