INTRODUCTION OF NEW ORDINANCES

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 79, 1966 was not delivered by the
Legal Department to the Office of the City Clerk.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 80, 1966

Introduced by Councilman Brydenthal:

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951,
General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, and more particu-
larly by Altering Fee Schedules as provided by Title 8, Chapter 4,
thereof, and fixing a time when said amendment shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL
OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That Title 8, Chapter 4, Section 8-401, of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, be amended to read:

8-401 Fee Paid to City Controller

1 — All fees for permits which are required to be paid by any section of this chapter, or elsewhere in this title and Municipal Code, shall be paid to the City Controller when such permits are issued by him, with the approval thereof by the Building Commissioner.

2 — The square footage as required hereinafter shall be measured to include the total floor area of the building, measured from outside to outside of enclosing walls and omitting basement areas wholly devoted to utility purposes.

Section 2. That Title 8, Chapter 4, Section 8-402, of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, be amended to read:

8-402 Fees for New Construction, Additions, Alterations and Repairs

Fees for the issuance of the permits provided for by this title, for various kinds of construction work, and inspections, shall be as follows:

1 — Industrial Buildings, Supermarkets, Public Garages, and Similar Structures Enclosing a Large Cubage with Little Interior Construction.

The permit fee for new structures or additions to existing structures, whereby ground area is increased shall be seventy-five cents (\$.75) for each 100 square feet or fraction thereof. Minimum fee shall be forty dollars (\$40.00).

2 — Public Buildings, Schools, Churches

The permit fee for new structures or additions to existing structures, whereby ground area is increased, shall be fifty cents (\$.50) for each 100 square foot, or fraction thereof. Minimum fee shall be twenty dollars (\$20.00), where said structures are publicly owned or owned and wholly occupied by religious or non-profit organizations.

3 — Structural Alterations or Additions above First Floor and Where Cost Exceeds One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

The permit fee for making structural alterations where cost ex-

ceeds one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or making additions only above the first floor level of any building or structure shall be based on the cost of doing such work at rate of four dollars (\$4.00) per thousand dollars of cost or fraction thereof. Minimum fee shall be ten dollars (\$10.00).

4 — Other Buildings

The permit fee for all other new buildings or additions to existing buildings whereby ground area covered is increased, shall be one dollar (\$1.00) for each 100 square foot or fraction thereof.

- (a) Minimum fee for private accessory buildings \$4.00
- (b) Minimum fee for one (1) and two (2) unit dwellings \$10.00
- (c) Minimum fee for commercial buildings \$40.00
- (d) Minimum fee for multiple residential buildings \$40.00
- (e) Minimum fees for all others \$20.00

5 — Square Footage not Available

Where the square footage cannot be determined the permit fee shall be based on an estimated cost of construction at the rate of four dollars (\$4.00) per one thousand dollars of cost, or fraction thereof.

10 — Wrecking

The permit fee to wreck any structure shall be as follows:

- (a) One and two unit houses \$15.00
- (b) Apartments up to eight units \$50.00
- (c) Apartments over eight units \$75.00
- (d) All others:
 - (a) Ground area up to 4,000 sq. ft. \$25.00
 - (b) Ground area up to 10,000 sq. ft. \$50.00
 - (c) Ground area over 10,000 sq. ft. \$75.00
- (e) For each additional story in height add \$5.00

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor, compliance with all laws pertaining thereto, and publication as required by law.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL
OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That Title 4, Chapter 8, Section 4-814.1 of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, be amended by the addition thereof of the following subsection, as follows:

No.	Street	Side	From	To
6	Market	South	East Street	Ogden Street

Section 2. This amendment shall be subject to the penalties as provided in Title 1, Chapter 8, Section 4-831 of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, as amended.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor, compliance with all laws pertaining thereto and publication, as required by law.

Introduced by Councilman Hasbrook:

AN ORDINANCE establishing a certain passenger and/or loading zone in the City of Indianapolis, pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as Amended, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That for the purpose of providing the owners or occupants of certain premises fronting on certain streets in the City of Indianapolis, with ingress and egress for passengers, materials and merchandise coming to or going from such premises, such owners or occupants having complied with the provisions of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, Section 4-1001, and the Board of Public Safety, after due investigation, having recommended the establishment of the same, the following passenger and/or loading zone be and the same is, hereby established in the City of Indianapolis, to-wit:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That for the expenses of the city government, and its institutions, for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1967, and ending December 31, 1967, the following sums of money are hereby appropriated out of the fund herein named and for the purposes herein specified, subject to the laws governing the same. Such sums herein appropriated shall be held to include all expenditures authorized to be made during the year, unless otherwise expressly stipulated and provided by law. The salaries established thereon are those fixed or recommended by the Mayor as provided for by law prior to August 1, 1966.

Section 2. (a) That for said fiscal year there is hereby appropriated out of the General Funds of said city, except those sums appearing hereinafter under the columns headed "Motor Vehicle Highway Tax" (Gas Tax), shown as "M.V.H. Tax," "Parking Meter," and "Cigarette Tax Fund," the sums as hereinafter appear in this section for the purposes herein named.

(b) That from the monies anticipated and estimated to be received from the State of Indiana during the fiscal year 1967 and allocated to said City of Indianapolis out of the revenues derived from license fees, or taxes, on gasoline, motor vehicles, cigarettes and other sources connected therewith, and all available balances therein, and constituting a "Special Funds" for the maintenance and repair of streets and bridges within said city, for policing and for other purposes connected with public streets, all as provided by law, which special funds do not affect or involve any special levy or rate, of taxes, for said city, there is hereby appropriated and allocated the sums appearing hereinafter under the column headed, "M.V.H. Tax," of the herein schedules of the Department of Public Works Administration, City Engineer, Street Commissioner, Traffic Engineer, Municipal Garage, Park Department and Police Department, also "Cigarette Tax" in Department of Public Works, to said departments of said city uses, germane to the purpose of said special funds and for the several purposes as hereinafter set out in said schedules of said departments.

(c) That from the monies anticipated and estimated to be received from parking meter receipts during the year 1967 and all available balances in said Fund, constituting a special parking meter fund under the heading Parking Meter Fund, for purchase, installation, relocation, removal and repair of parking meters and the records and personnel incidental thereto, together with the personnel and cost of installation and maintenance of traffic signals, tow-in trucks, snow plows, repairs and maintenance of public streets and places whereon parking meters are located and all streets or avenues intersecting or connected therewith and for off street parking facilities and which special fund does not involve a general tax levy for said city, the same is hereby appropriated and allocated under the heading Parking Meter Fund, to the departments hereinafter designated as using parking meter funds, namely, Departments of Finance, Off Street Parking, Traffic Engineer, Department of Works, Administration and Street Commissioner, and for the parking meter operating division itself.

Section 3. The salaries and compensations of the various officers and employees of the city, or prescribed for certain positions and duties, for the ensuing year as recommended and fixed by the mayor prior to August 1, 1966 and as now approved by the Common Council are hereby adopted and fixed at the respective amounts herein specified and appropriated therefor under the several departments and schedules therein set forth: Provided, however, that no person, official or employee whose salary or compensation is hereby fixed under any item, or by any ordinance hereafter adopted, shall have any vested right to receive such amount, or any minimum amount, except as may be accrued, or otherwise provided by a statute. Control as to any decrease shall be vested in the body or executive having direction over the one affected, as provided by law.

Section 4. That the auditor of Marion County, Indiana, be and he is hereby ordered and directed to place all such tax levies upon the property tax duplicates, and the county treasurer of such county, ex-officio city treasurer, be and he is hereby ordered and directed to collect the same for the City of Indianapolis, and each of said departments thereof, and make due report thereof as provided by law.

Section 5. That there is hereby levied and assessed or confirmed as may be required by law on all real estate and improvements and all personal property of whatever description, notes, bonds, stocks, chosen in action of every kind and character in the City of Indianapolis, as assessed and returned for taxation in said City for the year 1967, a tax rate of Two Dollars and Fifteen and nine-tenths cents (\$2.159) for general purposes of each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Seven and six-tenths cents (\$.076) City Sinking Fund for each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Fifteen and nine-tenths cents (\$.159) for Park General Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; County Assessed Valuation; Three and six-tenths cents (\$.036) for Park Sinking Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property County Assessed Valuation; Five cents (\$.05) for Park Cumulative Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property County Assessed Valuation; Fourteen and five-tenths cents (\$.145) for Police Pension Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Sixteen cents (\$.16) for Fire Pension Fund of each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Six and three-tenths cents (\$.063) for Redevelopment Fund for each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00)

valuation of such taxable property; Three and one-tenth cents (\$.031) for Redevelopment Sinking Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Three-tenths cents (\$.003) for City Market Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of such taxable property all of which levies are duly authorized by specific laws.

SUGGESTED RESOLUTION SUPPORTING A REFERENDUM ON THE QUESTION OF WHETHER A CONSTITUTIONAL SHOULD BE HELD

RESOLUTION NO. 8, 1966

Whereas, the present constitution of the State of Indiana was adopted in the year 1951; and

Whereas, the State of Indiana, at the time of the adoption of its constitution was predominantly rural; and

Whereas, the State, since the adoption of its constitution has evolved from a rural to an industrial state; and

Whereas, there have been few changes in the basic law because of the difficulties in amending the constitution; and

Whereas, the change in the economy of the State from rural to industrial accompanied by the vast changes in transportation facilities, population, living habits, conditions and needs of the people would seem to require a thorough study and evaluation of the fundamental law of the State; and

Whereas, this study and evaluation, if needed, can best be accomplished through a constitutional convention; and

Whereas, the people have not had an opportunity to express their opinion since 1914 on whether there is a need to study, re-evaluate and possibly change provisions of the Constitution; and

Whereas, the Indiana Municipal League in convention assembled on the 14th day of September, 1965, adopted a resolution in support

of a referendum to the people on the question of whether Indiana should call a constitutional convention; and

Whereas, it seems that the people of Indiana, after a lapse of 53 years, should and of right ought to be given the opportunity to again voice their opinion as to the advisability of a constitutional convention;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the common council of the city of Indianapolis that its members support and that they also urge the citizens of Indianapolis to support the passage of a bill in the 1967 session of the General Assembly of Indiana to provide for a referendum on the question of whether a constitutional convention should be called to study and re-evaluate the provisions of the Indiana Constitution.

The motion to adopt the Resolution was made by Mr. Kuykendall and seconded by Mr. Deluse and passed on the following roll call:

The Clerk was instructed to notify the County Council.
