The following report from the Board of Health was read and received:

Indianapolis, March 21st, 1881.

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—During the first days of the present month, numerous complaints reached this office, that the Blood Purifying establishment of Crocker & Becker, west of White river, was being conducted in such a manner as to be offensive to the surrounding residents and business men. A personal inspection was made by the Board, and some cause for complaint was found to exist. It was occasioned in part by the use of dead oil and carbolic acid, used liberally for the purpose of correcting the very evil it produced. But the principal cause was found to be in the insufficiency of the natural draft in the furnaces—the fires requiring forcing by a jet of steam, and thereby carrying the offensive gases through the furnaces so rapidly that some portion of them escapes from the furnace and smoke-stack without being burned. This defect has since been remedied by the erection of an additional smoke-stack, and also by passing all gases through a large bed of charcoal. The improvements have been made, and no cause can now be discovered for complaint. The preprietors exhibit such willingness to act on our suggestions regardless of expense, as to convince us that no means will be neglected which will enable them to run the establishment free from offense to the most fastidious.

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Finance, to whom sundry papers were referred, beg leave to report on them as follows:

1st. Is the report of the City Clerk and Treasurer for the month of February, which we have examined and compared with their respective books, and find them in proper form and correct—the Treasurer's showing a balance March 1st of \$17,790.49.

2d. Is the report of the Board of Public Improvement, which we find correct—the expenditures of this department to March 1st being \$27,684.25, out of an estimate of \$50,000; showing that this department is living within their estimate.

3d. Is the monthly report of C. A. Ritter, M. D., Superintendent of City Dispensary. The same is correct. The expenditures of the Dispensary to March 1st are \$2,073.86, out of an estimate of \$3,000; living also within their estimate.

4th. Is the report of W. W. Wishard, M. D. Superintendent of City Hospital and Branch, showing an expenditure for the month of February of \$827.22. The report, so far as committee can see, is correct. The Hospital expenses, being up to March 1st, \$8,108.07, out of an estimate of \$11,500, which your committee believes is within their estimate.

5th. Is the report of J. G. Pendergast, Chief Fire Engineer, and Fire Board. The same is in proper form, and, so far as your committee can ascertain, correct. The expenses of this department to March 1st are \$64,002.01, their estimate being \$86,104. By careful management this department can live well within their estimate.

Your committee would urge upon the heads of these different departments the necessity of procuring at lowest wholesale rates (if not already being done) the various articles necessary in their respective departments; and, for that purpose, itemized bills should be presented to your committee for the purpose of comparison.

Gentlemen:—Your Committee of Conference, after a close examination of the facts relative to the pay of extra police, are of the opinion that a change of the method of paying patrolmen known as "extras" is inexpedient at the present time. We find the present state of the Treasury only adequate to meet our necessities;

that the fiscal year has almost expired, and the estimate for the Police Department is already made. We recommend that the pay of the extra police as hereto-fore carried on be continued, and that they receive full compensation as regular patrolmen when on duty.

The following motions (adopted by the Common Council—see pages 976, 977, 978 and 979, ante) were read and severally concurrently adopted:

That Robert Long be permitted to put down a brick sidewalk in front of his property, No. 50 Broadway street, at his own expense, and according to stakes set by the City Civil Engineer.

That the Board of Health be, and are hereby, directed to instruct the Sanitary Police to notify all persons who may have placed ashes, manure, dirt or filth in the streets and alleys of the city, in violation of section 32 of the "Street and Alley" ordinance, to remove or cause the same to be removed within ten days after said notice may have been served; and on failure to comply with said notice, to file against them.

That the City Marshal be, and is hereby, directed to notify the owner of the property on the northeast corner of Maryland and Illinois streets to repair and put in good condition the brick sidewalk in front of said premises.

That the City Marshal be, and is hereby, directed to notify Kennedy, Shellanberger & Co., to repair the crossing of their railroad switch on Dacotah street, with enough broken stone to put the same in a passable condition—the work to be done within ten days, or the Street Commissioner to do the work at their expense.

Whereas, The east sidewalk on West street, between Georgia and Louisiana streets is low and sunken, and in rainy weather is covered with water so as to be almost impassable, and as there is obout sixty feet of said sidewalk, entering towards Louisiana, that is not either paved or planked, and on the street opposite to M. A. Johnson's coal office and Vandalia watchman's house there is about eighty feet that was not paved when the street was improved, and as the gutters are not opened nor sewers across Louisiana street under Vandalia Railroad tracks; therefore, be it

Moved, That the City Civil Engineer, Board of Public Improvements and City Attorney be directed to examine it and see what work is necessary to finish im-

provements on said street, and report at next meeting of Council.

The following petition was read, and the action of the Common Council granting the prayer of the petitioner (see page 979, ante) was concurred in:

Whitcomb, Superintendent of the Union Railway Company, as to the construction and maintainance of the safety gates at the crossing of Virginia avenue and the Union Railway tracks; also, on east side of Tennesse street and Louisiana street.

That the City Attorney procure an opinion from Attorney-General Baldwin as to the expiration of the term of office of the present Chief of the Fire Department, City Attorney, Wood Measurer, Market Master, City Treasurer, etc., and any other question the City Attorney may deem necessary for the interpretation of the law regarding municipal elections, approved March 7, 1881.

That permission be granted to Henry Smith and Mr. Ferguson to grade and pave with brick the sidewalk in front of their property on Second street, the same to be done under the direction of the City Civil Engineer; the work to be done within sixty days, at their own expense.

That the Committee on Public Property, with the City Treasurer and City Attorney, be directed to employ some responsible agent to take charge of the Tomlinson estate property, except No. 34 East Washington street, and to rent said buildings to the best advantage, under the direction of the Committee on Public Property, and that said agent be required to file a suitable bond, said bond to be approved by the City Attorney.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to fix the water fountain at the corner of Illinois and Seventh streets in proper condition for use,

That J. C. Walker be permitted to lay a brick sidewalk in front of his property on Bright street; said work to be done at his own expense and under the supervision of the City Civil Engineer.

That James McMurry be, and is hereby, granted permission to re-gravel and curb with wood, at his own expense, the sidewalk in front of his property on St. Mary street, corner of Alabama street.

That the Committee on Public Property be directed to see that the fence along the south side of the Southern Park is removed so as to permit the opening of the road along said park.
