The Common Council met pursuant to adjournment.

#### ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

Mr. Brown called up special appropriation ordinance No. 58-

An Ordinance to provide for the payment of sundry claims against the City of Indianapolis.

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Kappes called up special ordinance No. 71-1867, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures complete, to burn gas, except the service pipe, on St. Joseph street, between Delaware and Alabama streets,

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Burgess called up special ordinance No. 86-1867, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures, complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Georgia street, between Meridian and Illinois streets,

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

ORDINANCES ON THIRD READING.

In Ordinance to prevent trespassing upon the grounds known as the Governor's Circle.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Burgess, Coburn, Colley, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Kappes and Woodburn—11.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Burgess called up special ordinance No. 86-1867, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures, complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Georgia street, between Meridian and Illinois streets.

Which was read the third time, and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Burgess, Coburn, Colley, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Kappes, Stanton and Woodburn—12.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Goddard called up special ordinance No. 89-1867, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures, complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Tennessee street, between Washington and Maryland streets.

Which was read the third time, and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Burgess, Coburn, Colley, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Jameson, Kappes, Stanton and Woodburn—13.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Brown called up general ordinance No. 107, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE authorizing "The Indianapolis and St. Louis Railroad Company" to construct and maintain a track through the City of Indianapolis, and prescribing the terms thereof.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Burgess, Coburn, Colley, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Brown called up general ordinance No. 108, entitled:

An Ordinance authorizing the Bellefontaine Railway Company to construct, maintain and use a track through East Second street, and to change or

deviate from the line of its present track between Market and New York streets.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Your petitioner, James A. Kealing, represents to your honorable body that on or about the 28th day of December, 1862, he purchased two hundred and forty-six feet, fronting on Washington street, off of the front end of that part of out-lot 83, beginning 20 feet west of the north-east corner of said out-lot, and running thence west 20 feet. That said lot is 420 feet deep, terminating on Maryland street. That since said 28th day of December, 1862, the taxes upon the whole of said lot, viz., twenty feet wide and four hundred and twenty feet deep, have been assessed against the said James A. Kealing. That he has paid the taxes upon the whole of said lot for the years 1862 and 1866, inclusive, amounting to thirty-nine dollars and twenty cents.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays your honorable body that so much of said city taxes which he has paid, which should have been paid by the owner of the 174 feet of said lot fronting on Maryland street, be refunded to him.

Your petitioners respectfully ask your honorable body to pass an ordinance to grade and gravel Merrill street and sidewalks, from the east side of West street to the west side of Missouri street.

Your petitioners would further state that the above portion of Merrill st.

is much traveled, and part of it is so low as to become very muddy in wet times.

Mr. Brown introduced special ordinance No. 91-1867, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures, complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Illinois street, between South and Garden streets.

Which was read the first and second times and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

That a select committee of three be appointed to inquire whether the contractor for paving portions of Louisiana street, between Meridian and Illinois streets, has complied with his contract, and whether the work has been done in a workmanlike manner.

Which was adopted.

The Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Orrin Aborn and others, beg leave to report that there has been no objection, in the shape of remonstrances, filed or presented against the proposed vacation of ten (10) feet on each side of Broadway street where the same is now 100 feet in width, and that proof of publication has been made, in due form, of the giving notice, as required by law, of the pendency of the peti-

Resolved, That the City Clerk notify the Commissioners for appraising and assessing the damages and benefits accruing to the owners of lots or lands through which any street is proposed to be constructed, that tney will be required to meet at the City Council Chamber. in Indianapolis, on Monday the 11th day of November, 1867, for the purpose of hearing and examining the matters and things contained in the petition presented to the Common Council by John W. Byrkit and others, asking that 25 feet off of the north side of out-lot 124 be vacated, so as to make Norwood street fifty (50) feet in width, and to appraise and assess the damages and benefits accruing to the owners of lots or lands through which such proposed street may be constructed, and to make report thereon to this Council.

Resolved, That the City Clerk be directed to give the notice to property owners or agents required to be given in such cases by section 63 of the City Charter, to the owners or agents of property to be affected by the opening of the proposed street.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Public Improvements, to whom the bids were referred, would respectfully report that Aaron Frazee is the lowest bidder to grade and pave the sidewalks on Indiana Avenue, between Illinois and Mississippi streets, his bid being 64 cents per lineal foot.

We have examined the remonstrance of Mr. Bambarger and others, and find some names of non-residents on it, therefore we would recommend that a remonstrance of that kind be not entertained, and the work be let to the

above named party.

Also, that the petition of A. Bird, in reference to paving Indiana Avenue, be not granted.

Also, that S. W. & R. H. Patterson are the best bidders to grade and gravel Bright street and sidewalks, between New York and North streets, bid being 75 cents per lineal foot on each side of street.

Also, that the Indianapolis Gas Light and Coke Company are the only bidders for the erection of lamps and fixtures on Michigan street, between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets.
