CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,
SATURDAY, JUNE 18, 1870, 7½ O'CLOCK P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, John S. Newman, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Harrison, Kahn, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Pyle, Reagan, Shepherd, Thoms, Weaver, Whitsit and Wiles—15.

The proceedings of the called session, held June 13, 1870, were read and approved.

Mr. Wiles from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report:

Indianapolis, June 18, 1870.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Contracts to whom was referred sundry proposals, have examined the same, and would recommend that contracts be awarded as follows:

First.—For grading and paving with brick, the South sidewalk on Ohio street from New Jersey to East street, to Hanway and Rubush, at sixty-four cents per lineal foot front.

Second.—For grading and graveling Broadway street and sidewalks, from the old Corporation line to Christian avenue, to David Sylvester, at ninetyone cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Third.—For grading and graveling the alley running north and south through out-lot 38, from Walnut street to Fort Wayne avenue, to John J. Palmer, at 33 cents per lineal foot front.

Fourth.—For grading and paving with brick, the west sidewalk on Alabama street, between North and St. Clair street, to Joseph Kruger, at seventy cents per lineal foot front.

Fifth.—For grading and bouldering Chesapeake alley, from Meridian to Illinois street, to Richard Carr, at ninety cents per lineal front on each side.

Sixth.—For grading and paving with brick, the north sidewalk, and curbing the outside edge of the sidewalk with stone, of Maryland street, from Illinois street to Kentucky avenue, to John Richardson, at one dollar and tencents for paving, and eighty cents per front foot for curbing.

Seventh.—For grading and graveling the first alley south of Georgia street, running from Cady street to Corporation line east,, to James Mahoney, at thirty-one cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Eighth.—For grading and paving with brick, the east sidewalk on New Jersey street, from Washington street to Massachusetts avenue, to Charles Roney, at sixty-six cents per lineal foot front.

Ninth.—For grading, bouldering and curbing the outside edges of the side-walks with white oak curbing, Georgia street, from East to Noble street, to James Mahoney, at one dollar per lineal foot front for bouldering, and twen-ty-five cents per foot front for curbing, on each side.

Tenth.—For grading and bouldering the gutters on Benton street to Richard Carr, at seventy cents per foot front on each side.

Eleventh.—For grading and graveling the alley running north and south through out-lot 92, from Louisiana to South street, to James Mahoney, at thirty-seven cents per foot front on each side.

Twelfth.—For grading and graveling Court street and sidewalks, and bouldering the crossings of the streets and alleys the width of the sidewalks to James Mahoney, at thirty-eight cents per lineal foot front on each side, and eighty-five cents per square yard, superficial for bouldering.

Thirteenth.—For grading and bouldering Pennsylvania street, from North street to north side of St. Clair street, to Patterson and Dunning, at two dollars and sixty-five cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Fourteenth.—For grading and bouldering Pennsylvania street from St. Clair street to north side of First street, to Patterson and Dunning, at one dollar and seventy-seven cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Fifteenth.—For grading and paving with brick, the north sidewalk on Walnut street from East to Alabama street, to James Mahoney, at forty-nine cents per lineal foot front.

Sixteenth.—For grading and graveling Gregg street and sidewalks, from Jackson street to first alley west of Jackson street, to Robert H. Patterson, at seventy five cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Seventeenth.—For grading and graveling the alley running east and west from Noble to Cedar street, and between Fletcher avenue and Huron street, to Cogill and Bernauer, at thirty-four cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Eighteenth.—For grading and graveling Severn alley, between New York and Vermont street, to James Mahoney, at 75 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Ninetcenth.—For grading and paving with brick, the west sidewalk on New Jersey street, from Washington street to Massachusetts avenue, to Joseph Kruger, at sixty eight cents per lineal foot front.

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred a remonstrance signed by James M. Huntington and others, against the proposed erection of a steam saw mill and dry kiln, in the vicinity of the corner of Mississippi and Pratt street, beg to report that the 32d clause of the 53d section of the City Charter empowers the Council to pass and enforce ordinances to prevent the erection of wooden buildings in such portions of the city as the Common Council may determine, etc.

The first section of "an ordinance concerning the prevention of fires," ordained November 30, 1863, defines certain fire limits within which no "buildings, or additions shall be erected, unless the outer wall thereof be composed of brick or stone with mortar." The proposed buildings are not located within said limits, and the erection of the same would not be in violation of any existing ordinance.

If, however, after said buildings are erected, they "prove liable to endanger life or property," the Council may "provide for the removal and taking down of the same.

Your Committee have held a conference with the Board of School Trustees and carefully examined said subject, and have found that the levy made is not sufficient by about one-third, to carry on the schools as they should be the ensuing year.

The undersigned, Trustees, have the honor further to report, that during the school year, or ten months time, ending June, 1868, there were 4,949 children in the public schools, taught by sixty-two teachers, at an aggregate expense of \$34,007 80. That during the year ending June, 1869, there were 5,160 children, taught by seventy-eight teachers, at an expense of \$44,470 07. That during the year just closed, there were 6,000 children in your public schools, taught by ninety-two teachers, at an aggregate expense, as given above, of \$54,092 48.

At the same ratio of increase of children desiring to attend your schools the next year, the increase in expense must be proportionably large, and will closely approximate the sum of \$64,000 without any increase of salary, or any provision for that part of the city recently embraced in the corporation.

To meet this expense, we have the balance above stated, now on hand_\$24,911 58  We will receive from the State in November5,000 00  Estimated amount due from the city on last levy2,500 00

Estimated amount necessrry to carry on the schools in the new territory,

This sum must be raised by special taxation in the city to carry on the schools for the coming year, as they have been conducted, and to meet the demands caused by the extension of the city. Last year we made no addition to the taxation on account of the colored children, included in the above estimate.

The power to levy a special tax rests solely with the Council. We assure your Honors, that we wish to organize and carry on the schools in accordance with your wishes, and the means placed in our hands. As the law prohibits the Trustees from contracting any debts for tuition purposes, should you see proper to furnish us with less means than we believe necessary for the schools as

now organized, we shall arrange the schools to suit your views; either by reducing the length of the term, or excluding a large number of children who will apply for admission to the schools.

Those who voted in the affirmative were, Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Harrison, Kahn, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Pyle, Thoms, Weaver, Whitsit and Wiles—12.

Those who voted in the negative were, Councilmen Kennington and Reagan—2.

Action on the subject was postponed for one week.

On motion the Council adjourned.
