### APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE NO. 1, 1936

AN ORDINANCE appropriating and allocating the sum of Ninety-four Thousand Five Hundred Forty-three Dollars and Sixty-four Cents (\$94,543.64), received on January 4, 1936, from the State

of Indiana as revenue under the Gasoline Tax, to the following departments of the City of Indianapolis, in the amounts specified in accordance with the provisions of Section 3A of General Ordinance No. 70, 1935, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE NO. 2, 1936

AN ORDINANCE appropriating moneys out of the anticipated unappropriated and unexpended balance of the General Fund for the year 1936 to certain designated funds, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SPECIAL ORDINANCE NO. 9, 1936

AN ORDINANCE changing the name of a certain street in the City of Indianapolis and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SPECIAL ORDINANCE NO. 1, 1936

PURSUANT TO an Act of the Legislature of the State of Indiana, the City of Indianapolis is hereby authorized to convey and deed, under such conditions as the proper officers of said city may determine, to the State of Indiana, for the purposes of erecting and maintaining an armory.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 2, 1936

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit dumping and depositing of substances and materials in waterways and watercourses located in the City of Indianapolis and within ten (10) miles thereof, and prohibiting dumping and depositing of materials and substances without first having obtained permits from certain boards; providing a penalty for the violation thereof; repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith; specifically repealing Section 721, 722 and 723 of General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, known as Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1925, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 4, 1936

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the city controller of the City of Indianapolis to make a temporary loan, or loans, in the sum of Five

Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) in anticipation of current revenues of said city actually levied and in the course of collection for the fiscal year in which such loan, or loans, are made payable out of the current revenues of said city for such year, authorizing the rate of interest to be charged therefor, providing for legal notice, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 5, 1936

AN ORDINANCE amending Section 1 of General Ordinance No. 1, 1935, an ordinance amending Section 122 of General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, commonly known as the Municipal Code of 1925, as amended by General Ordinances Nos. 78, 85 and 103 of 1931, No. 25 of 1932, and No. 51 of 1933, repealing General Ordinance No. 2, 1927, and naming an effective date.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 104, 1935

As Amended

AN ORDINANCE amending General Ordinance No. 96, 1928, by adding thereto a new and supplemental section, Section 36½, making owners of vehicles prima facie responsible for the parking of said vehicles, and naming an effective date.

INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 11, 1936

AN ORDINANCE to amend General Ordinance No. 114, 1922, com-

monly known as the Zoning Ordinance, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:**

Section 1. That the U3 or business district, the A3 or 2,400 square foot area district and the H1 or 50 foot height district be and the same are hereby amended, supplemented and extended so as to include the following described territory.

Beginning at a point on the west property line of South Meridian Street, 133.4 feet north of the north property line of Raymond Street; thence west and parallel to the said north property line of Raymond Street a distance of 130 feet to a point; thence north and parallel to the west property line of Meridian Street to a point 5 feet north of the south line of Lot 1 of Barger Heirs Addition, as recorded in Land Record VV, page 403, in the office of the Recorder of Marion County; thence east and parallel to the said south line of Lot 1 a distance of 130 feet to a point; thence south on and along the west property line of Meridian Street to the point or place of beginning.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the mayor and publication according to law.

**GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 12, 1936**

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the board of health and the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, through its duly authorized purchasing agent, to purchase the yearly supply of milk for use in and in connection with the Indianapolis City Hospital, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:**

Section 1. That the board of health of the City of Indianapolis, through its duly authorized purchasing agent, be and it is hereby

authorized to purchase the yearly supply of fresh milk for use at the City Hospital, approximate deliveries thereof established at one hundred ten (110) gallons (more or less) daily, said milk to be of the kind and quality according to the specifications on file in the department of public purchase in conformity with the uses as prescribed by the management of the Indianapolis City Hospital.

Section 2. That said purchase shall be made from the lowest and best bidder thereon whose bid has now been received after the heretofore published advertisement for competitive bids therefor according to law, and the total cost thereof shall not exceed the sum of Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$7,791.50).

Section 3. That the purchase price for said milk shall be paid out of funds heretofore appropriated to the department of public health and charities for the year 1936.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 13, 1936

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the board of public safety of the City of Indianapolis, through its duly authorized purchasing agent, to receive bids for the purchase of, and to purchase one (1) automobile to be used in the service of the Indianapolis Police Department, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That the board of public safety, through its duly authorized purchasing agent, be and it is hereby authorized to receive bids, after duly advertising therefor according to law, and make purchase of one (1) seven (7) passenger automobile to be used by the police department for police work.

Section 2. That the said purchase shall be made from the lowest and best bidder, or bidders, after advertising for competitive bids



therefor, and the total cost of said automobile shall not exceed the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Seventy-six Dollars and Seventy-five Cents (\$2,176.75), and a credit to be applied thereon for trade-in of police department car No. 57 Stutz 1927 model.

Section 3. That the purchase price of said equipment shall be paid out of the fund heretofore appropriated to the board of public safety for the police department.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 14, 1936

AN ORDINANCE establishing certain passenger and/or loading zones in the City of Indianapolis, pursuant to the provisions of Section 26 of General Ordinance No. 96, 1928, as amended by General Ordinance No. 31, 1931, as amended by General Ordinance No. 58, 1931, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That for the purpose of providing the owners or occupants of certain premises fronting on certain public streets in the City of Indianapolis with ingress and egress for passengers, materials and merchandise coming to or going from such premises, such owners or occupants having complied with the provisions of Section 26 of General Ordinance No. 96, 1928, as amended by General Ordinance No. 31, 1931, as amended by General Ordinance No. 58, 1931, relative to the establishment of passenger and/or loading zones, at the places hereinafter set out, and the board of public safety having caused investigation to be made thereof and having recommended the establishment, pursuant to the terms of the aforesaid ordinances, the following passenger and/or loading zones be and the same are hereby established in the City of Indianapolis, to-wit:

18 feet in front of No. 113 Monument Place, said premises being occupied by Indianapolis Water Company.

18 feet in front of No. 10 West Maryland Street, said premises being occupied by Kiefer Stewart Company.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the mayor and publication according to law.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 15, 1936

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the Board of Public Works and Sanitation to purchase two (2) motorized scarifiers, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That the Board of Public Works and Sanitation, through its duly authorized purchasing agent, is hereby authorized to purchase two (2) motorized scarifiers at a cost not to exceed Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) each.

Section 2. Said two (2) motorized scarifiers shall be purchased only after advertisement for competitive bids according to law, and purchase made from the lowest and best bidder, or bidders.

Section 3. That the purchase price for said scarifiers be paid out of Gasoline Tax Fund No. 72—Equipment, appropriated to the Board of Public Works and Sanitation, Administration.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.
