On motion by Councilman Trusler, the following entitled ordinance was called up:

G. O. 29, 1885—An ordinance requiring saloon keepers to pay an annual license of forty-eight dollars for the use of the General Fund of the City of Indianapolis.

Councilman Thalman moved to lay the motion on the table which was pending on the adjournment of the Common Council at its last session, "That action be postponed until the second meeting in November."

The ordinance was then ordered engrossed, read the third time and passed, by the following vote:

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the City Treasurer of said city be, and he is hereby, authorized and instructed to make a temporary loan in the name and on behalf of said city, in anticipation of the current years' revenues, of the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000 00), the same being needed to defray the current expanses of said city; said loan to run until April 1st, 1886; Provided, that the interest allowed shall not exceed five percent per annum, which may be paid in advance or otherwise, as may be most beneficial to the city.

And Resolved further, That the Mayor and City Clerk be, and they are hereby, authorized to execute the obligation to be given for the loan above provided for, in the name and on behalf of said city; and for the payment of any such obligation so given, the faith of the City of Indianapolis is hereby irrevocably pledged.

We recommend the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

Councilman Thalman moved to amend the above ordinance so as to provide that the sum expended should be taken from the "Special Sewer Fund."

Which amendment was adopted.

The ordinance was then ordered engrossed as amended, read the third time and passed, by the following vote:

Councilman Pearson introduced the following entitled ordinance; which was read the first time:

S. O. 109, 1885—An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the first alley south of Second street, from Illinois street to Superior street.

The following entitled ordinance was read the second time:

G. O. 31, 1885—An ordinance to provide for the construction of an eighteen (18) inch Akron pipe sewer, in and along Michigan street, from Massachusetts avenue to the first alley east of East street.

Councilman Trusler moved that the Common Council do now adjourn.

Which failed of adoption, by the following vote:
