The Common Council met in regular session.

The proceedings of the regular session held April 1st, 1872, were read and approved.

Sealed proposals for the construction of a sewer in and upon North Illinois street were opened, read and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Mr. Craft, from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Contracts to whom was referred sundry proposals for improvement of streets, have examined the same and would recommend that the contracts be awarded as follows :

FIRST.

To grade and gravel Park avenue, and pave the sidewalks with brick, from Christian to Forest Home avenue, to Messrs. Hanway and Company at one dollar and five cents per lineal foot front, on each side of the line improved.

SECOND.

To grade and pave with brick the west sidewalk of New Jersey Street, from Merrill to McCarty street, to Thos. Roney at fifty cents per front foot, on the line improved.

THIRD.

To grade and pave with brick the north sidewalk on New York street, between Massachusetts avenue and East street, to James W. Hudson at fifty-nine cents per lineal foot front, on the line improved.

ORDINANCES ON FIRST READING.

Dr. Woodburn presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, owners of the real estate fronting on Tennessee street, between Pratt and First streets, respectfully

petition your honorable body to pass an ordinance providing for grading the alley running north and south from Pratt to First street, and between Tennessee and Mississippi streets, the same to be graded according to the Engineers directions, and after the same is graded to be covered with Rolling Mill cinders to a width of fifteen feet, and to a depth of ten inches in the center and sloping to five inches at the sides; the sidewalks to be graveled to a depth of eight inches with good river or creek gravel, and on top of the cinders a coat of gravel be placed three inches in thickness.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

Dr. Woodburn introduced Special Ordinance No. 70, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to grade, gravel and cover with Rolling Mill cinders the alley running north and south from Pratt to First streets, between Mississippi and Tennessee streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Reagan introduced Special Ordinance No. 71, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to grade and gravel Merrill street and sidewalks, from Tennessee to Mississippi streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Reagan presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—Your petitioner respectfully represents to your honorable Council that he is the owner of two lots, 180 feet, on Merrill

street, on the south side of block No. 29, in the city of Indianapolis, and the Council has under consideration the grading and graveling of three or four squares on said street, my request to your honorable Council is to have each square let out by itself, so the property holders on a square that does not need so much filling up will not have to pay the same as the squares that need so much filling up. A person who buys a lot on a square that does not need so much filling up he pays more for said lot, another person buys a lot on a square, three or four squares distant, which needs much filling up he does not pay so much for said lot, then is it correct for the person who paid a high price for his lot to pay for the improvement on the square where the person bought his lot so cheap, I think you will answer no such proceedings is not just? The square which I own lots on commences at Missouri street, and there is as much, or nearly as much dirt to take off the high half of said square as will fill up the lower half of said square, between Missouri and Mississippi streets, thus you see that it will not cost so much as some of the squares that from one side of them to the other need more filling up than one half of the square alluded to. If letting out this contract, these squares be put together, is correct, why was it not done so on the south side of this square, Mississippi street, when it was let out for grading and graveling a year or so past, this square and the square north, between South and Garden streets, was let out at one time and they were let out separately, which should be done in this improvement; the square of grading between South and Garden streets was only about forty cents per foot, and the square adjoining was nearly two dollars per foot, between Garden and Merrill streets, if it was correct then it is surely correct now; then your petitioner asks of your honorable body that you will act honorably with me, which I believe you will do when it is properly presented to your honorable body, by presenting this petition I do not favor the improvement, but when the improvement is made it should be so let.

Mr. Reagan introduced Special Ordinance No. 72, 1872, entitled:

An Ordinance to grade and gravel Merrill streets and sidewalks, from Mississippi to Missouri streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Kennington introduced Special Ordinance No. 73, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to grade, pave with brick and with curb stone the west sidewalk of Pennsylvania street, between Pogues' Run and Madison avenue.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Heckman introduced Special Ordinance No. 74, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp posts, lamps and fixtures complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Washington street, between Orien street and the corporation line.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Heckman introduced General Ordinance No. 25, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to build a sewer on the first alley east of East street, running parallel with East street to Merrill street, thence on Merrill street 120 feet.

Which was read the first time, and referred to the Committee on Sewers.

Mr. Cottrell introduced Special Ordinance No. 75, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to grade, pave with brick and curb with stone, where not already properly paved and curbed, the East sidewalk of Virginia avenue, from Louisiana to South street.

Which was read the first time.

ROLL CALL.

Mr. Batty offered the following motion.

Moved: That the Street Commissioner have posts erected on the north side of the pavement on the south side of the East Market square, so as to prevent the wood wagons from backing on the pavement.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Batty presented the following remonstrance:

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—We the undersigned residing on and owning real estate fronting on the North side of Malott avenue, would respectfully and earnestly remonstrate against the passage of an ordinance, now pending before your honorable body, providing for the paving with brick the north sidewalk on Malott avenue, from the Peru railroad to Columbia street (formerly Barrow street). We have but recently paid for the graveling of said avenue and sidewalks, and consider the sidewalk good enough for the present, and protest against being burdened with the expenses of the improvement proposed in said ordinance.

Granville Stills 194 3-12 feet, J A Weber 49 5-12 feet, Alfred Cahill 189 3-12 feet, Levi Wright 140 3-12 feet, John Frick 195 feet, John Brown and Stills, these parties represent all the property on the north side of said avenue but 6 feet.

Which was received, and on motion Special Ordinance No. 65, 1872, was stricken from the files.

Mr. Batty presented the following petition.

GENTLEMEN—We the undersigned, property owners, would respectfully petition your honorable body to take such action as will cause Peru street to be opened and extended from its present southeastern terminus to Massachusetts avenue, to a width of sixty feet.

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, owners of the real estate fronting on St. Mary street, between Alabama street and Western avenue, respectfully show to your honorable body that they have already, at their own expense and without cost to the city, filled up and graded to the proper height the sidewalks on said St. Mary street in front of their respective lots, lying on the south side of said street.

Therefore we pray that we may have credit for such work as we have already done, and also that we may be permitted to put down a brick sidewalk in front of our said lots, at our own expense and have credit therefor, after the proper grade of such sidewalk is fixed by the City Engineer.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

Mr. Bigham offered the following motion :

Moved: That the City Sreet Commissioner be and is hereby directed to at once remove the wooden bridges and crossings on the north side of Washington street, between Noble and Cruse streets,

and to fill the places so occupied by said wooden bridges and crossings with dirt, gravel, &c., and that the Street Commissioner take as much of said timber as will be required and erect a foot bridge over Pogues' Run on Ohio street.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Bigham offered the following remonstrance :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—Since the passage of the ordinance for paving Market street, from Pennsylvania to Delaware street, with a wooden block pavement, the Congress has appropriated one hundred thousand dollars (\$1000,000) for an addition to the Post Office, the work of constructing that building will block up and *ase* up any pavement that may be laid. Further more the property owners have no faith in the kind of block pavement you have contracted for, being a square pine block, six inches long, set on the sand, we would prefer the bouldered gutters and gravel street as it now is at the same price we are required to pay for this kind of wooden block. Furthermore we are informed that there was but a few cents difference between the bid for this pavement and a regular Nicholson, which we firmly believe will out-wear five of it.

The ordinance on which this contract was let is void, it not having been signed by the Mayor as require by section 78 of your charter, before the contract was made under it.

We respectfully ask the Council to reconsider the vote by which this contract was let, and postpone the letting until next spring.

We hereby notify the Common Council, and the Contractor Mr. J. J. Palmer, that we protest against the consummation of this contract, and will resist by every legal means the making of such street or any assessment against us for the same.

Resolved, That the City Assessor be directed to assess all property at its cash value, and to equalize any assessment that may have been made for 1872 on this basis.

Mr. Craft moved to refer the resolution to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Kennington moved to lay Mr. Crafts motion on the table.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—Councilmen Bigham, Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Reagan, Thalman and Woodburn—11.

Negative—Councilmen Batty, Craft, Newman, Thoms and Wiles—5.

The resolution was then adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—Councilmen Bigham, Brown, Cottrell, Craft, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Reagan, Thalman, Thoms and Woodburn—13.

Negative—Councilmen Batty, Newman and Wiles—3.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned respectfully petition you honorable

body to pass an ordinance for the laying of cross walks across South Illinois street, at the western termination of Pearl street.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion :

Moved: That the Street Commissioner give ten days notice to the local agent of the Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Lafayette railroad company that they will be required to remove the trustle work from Pogues' Run adjoining the Gas Works property, between Pennsylvania and Delaware streets, and in case of failure to so remove such trustle work, that the Street Commissioner is hereby authorized to remove the same at the expense of such railroad corporation.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion :

Moved: That a Select Committee be appointed with, power to act, to arrange for the change of water and gas pipes, and for the protection of railroad tracks and sewers during the construction of the Illinois street tunnel.

Which was adopted, and his Honor appointed as such Committee Councilmen Brown, Marsee and Locke.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion :

Moved: That the City Marshal and Chief of Police be instructed to enforce the provisions of section 19, of the ordinances regulating

and protecting streets, alleys, sidewalks, &c., &c., ordained December 28, 1863, page 156 of the Revised Ordinances, which prohibits the throwing into Pogues' Run filthy and other substances.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Brown offered the following preamble and resolution :

WHEREAS, The growth of our city is such that the necessary expenditures required to furnish good bridges, good streets and street crossings, an efficient fire and police department, the lighting the public lamps, and such other items of legitimate expenditures as are necessary to secure health and convenience to our people, will absorb all our revenues for the ensuing year. *Therefore be it*

Resolved. That this Council pledges itself to make no appropriation in aid of any railroad or manufacturing enterprise, or as donations for any purpose whatever.

Dr. Woodburn offered the following amendment :

Except in cases of benevolence and charity.

Which was adopted.

The preamble and resolution as amended was then adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Brown, Craft, Gimber, Kennington, Reagan, Thalman and Woodburn—9.

Negative—Councilmen Cottrell, Heckman, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Thoms and Wiles—7.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion :

Moved: That the City Clerk be instructed to report how much money has been paid by the city to the Marion county Courts, from the first of March 1871, to March 1, 1872, and to whom paid and for what paid.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion :

Moved: That in the coming city elections for one Councilman from each Ward, that the selection of inspectors and judges shall be chosen in the following manner: One inspector and judge for each Ward shall be designated by the Republican members of the Common Council, and one judge from each Ward shall be selected by the Democratic members of the Common Council.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion :

Moved: That the City Engineer be instructed to give Samuel Lefever a final estimate for grading and bouldering the first alley east of Delaware street, between Cumberland and Maryland streets.

Which was referred to the City Civil Engineer.

Mr. Craft presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 8, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, owners of the real estate fronting on the north side of Lockerbie street, between Liberty and Noble streets, respectfully petition your honorable body to pass an order giving us the privilege of grading and graveling the north sidewalk on Lockerbie street, between Liberty and Noble streets, and direct the Engineer to give us the stakes.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

Mr. Craft introduced Special Ordinance No. 76, 1872, entitled:

An Ordinance to grade and gravel the north sidewalk of Lockerbie street, from Liberty to Noble street.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Craft offered the following motion:

Moved: That the Committee on Parks consider and report to this Council, on next Monday night, the propriety of opening University and Circle parks to the public at an early day.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Brown moved to reconsider the vote by which the Council at its last meeting, laid upon the table, a communication from the Indianapolis Gas Light and Coke Company.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Brown, Cottrell, Craft, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Reagan, Thalman, Thoms, Wiles and Woodburn—16.

Negative—None.

Mr. Brown then moved that the prayer of the petitioner be granted for the paving only.

Which was adopted.

The Committee on Revision of Ordinances was instructed to draft and introduce a new ordinance for the paving only of the east sidewalk of Pennsylvania street, from Washington street to Madison avenue, excepting so much as is owned by the Indianapolis Gas Light and Coke Company.

Mr. Gimber offered the following motion :

His Honor, the Mayor, presented the following :

This indenture and agreement witnesses that Mary F. Tomlinson, widow and sole heir and legatee, under the will of her late husband, Stephen D. Tomlinson, late of the city of Indianapolis, county of Marion, State of Indiana, deceased; and the city of Indianapolis, by its constituted authorities, which said city by the last will and testament of said decedent, becomes the residuary legatee under said will, after the demise of the said Mary F. Tomlinson of the estate of said decedent.

And it hereby agreed between said Mary F. Tomlinson and said city of Indianapolis, in consideration of the mutual interests of the parties, that said city of Indianapolis shall pay and save the real estate of said decedent of all taxes whatever, State, county, city, township, school, road or other lawful taxes, street improvements or other lawful assessments thereon, no matter by what lawful authority they be imposed, and save the said estate and said Mary F. Special Ordinance No. 68, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Tinker street and sidewalks, and for other purposes, from Western avenue to Hill avenue.

Was read the third time, and on motion referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and City Civil Engineer.

General Ordinance No. 23, 1872, entitled :

An Ordinance relative to the erection of a slaughter house by Barnabas Coffin, and prescribing certain regulations concerning the same.

Was read the second time.

When Mr. Brown moved to amend by inserting after the words "White river," in the second paragraph of the second section, the words, " at a point below the Water Works."

Which amendment was lost by the following vote :
